

the regular session of the Washington Township Trustees

at the Township Hall, Lewistown, Monday, June 14, 2021 at 6:30 PM

The Washington Township Trustees met in regular session on Monday, June 14, 2021 at 6:30 PM at the Washington Township Hall. Teleconference Participant: Gary Bias Others present were: Washington Twp. Officer Earl Wisener, Russell's Point Officer Logan Miller, Russell's Point Chief Joe Freyhof, Butch & Cheryl Dilbone, Greg Freytag, Brandon, and Kevin Barth.

The meeting was opened by Trustee Lewis with the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag and Fiscal Officer Miller read roll call. Present were: Trustee Lewis, Trustee Faulder, Trustee Berg, Chief Core, Gary Bias, Lisa Miller and John Newland. Trustee Faulder made a motion to approve the minutes from the regular meetings held on April 12, 2021 and the May 10, 2021 and accept them as written. Trustee Berg seconded the motion. All answered "Aye" – motion passed 3-0.

**Financial Obligations** - The Fiscal Officer presented financial obligations to the trustees. Trustee Faulder made a motion to pay all financial obligations. Trustee Berg seconded the motion and all answered "Aye" – motion passed 3-0.

**Financial Reports** - Fiscal Officer Miller presented to the Trustees for the period of 5/1/2021 – 5/31/2021 a Bank Reconciliation, Fund Status Report, Receipt Register, Appropriation Status, Revenue Status, Payment Register for their review and signatures. Trustee Faulder made a motion to approve the financial reports and Trustee Berg seconded the motion. All answered Aye – motion passed 3-0.

**Presentations to Officer Earl Wisener and Officer Logan Miller**

- Chief Core: We appreciate all the people in attendance tonight and it is so nice to be able to share something good that happened with all of you. It has to do with these two Officers, Washington Township Officer Earl Wisener and Russell's Point Officer Logan Miller. And, back there is Russell's Point Chief of Police, Joe Freyhof. One of the greatest privileges serving as Washington Township Police Chief is working with extraordinary people like these two Officers standing here before you. Myself, Joe Freyhof and the Village of Russells Point were made aware that on May 26, 2021 at approximately 4:45 PM Officer Earl Wisener and Officer Logan Miller responded to an emergency call for service in reference to a six-week-old infant that was not breathing. Both Officer Wisener and Officer Miller responded. Officer Miller found the infant was not breathing and administered lifesaving procedures. After those efforts the baby expelled some stomach content and was able to draw a breath. Still unsure if the baby would be able to maintain normal breathing Officer Miller passed the infant to Officer Wisener who took additional steps to maintain the infant's airway until the IL EMS arrived and took over. The infant was released from the hospital two weeks later. This mother has conveyed publicly that she is grateful for both Officers and said if the two Officers had not been available to respond so quickly, she would be attending her daughter's funeral instead of picking her up at the hospital. It is with honor and great privilege to give Officer Wisener and Officer Miller this award and recognition. I apologize I thought I had frames for each of them but they didn't fit. Chief Core to Chief Freyhof: Chief Freyhof, do you have anything to say? Chief Freyhof: Not much, you pretty well covered it. Just thinking as I walked in here that it's nice to see the cooperation and support between the two Police Departments that allows us to work so well together. Just yesterday there was a burglary in progress and the two Departments worked together to take care of that situation as well. Happy to be a part of that and experience that. I also appreciate Officer Meyer coming today to support his brother.

**Public Comments**

- **Brandon Hines** - We built a home on corner of Park/Mauger a couple years ago and are now full-time. We're retired now and just wanted to find out what's going on in the Township. Also, have a question while I'm here. People who own a lot behind the home we built have built a garage and that's fine I did approve the variance. It's a very plain garage. My understanding is they were told they were not allowed to do anything to improve the appearance. I see another garage on Orchard Road / Park Street that has windows and stone and looks more attractive. Just wanted to make a comment that as someone who built a home in the Township I would like it if there was consistency in how this is done. I would think that if owners of garages could make the garage more attractive it would increase their property value. I don't know who makes those decisions, how they get made, so wanted to mention this. Gary Bias: It definitely wasn't me that gave that direction. Usually, the neighbors living next to the garages that look like a garage would prefer they look more like a house or a cottage. But, there is nothing in the zoning code that restricts them from using metal siding and things like that. I do suggest that they try to make these garages more attractive. Trustee Lewis: So, Gary does his job. Brandon: Ok, that brings me to another point and I don't mean to be taking up all of the time. Are there situations where I got my permit from the Township and JR got his from the County and the two have different information? Trustee Lewis: No, for the Township you get it from the Township. It depends on what you are building – that determines if you go to the township or the county. Most of the time you will come to the township. Gary, is that correct? Gary: Yes, the structure on the land is what you would need our zoning for. The Logan County Building Authority which covers all of Logan County is the one that has certain restrictions about how these places must be built. Brandon: Ok, thank you!
- **Cheryl Dilbone** - Two old business items, the first being the convex mirror at the corner we talked about at the last meeting, I did talk to Jim Reed. He said it wouldn't technically be on their property and the utility pole might be the best place to put it and he was willing to contribute to it. I looked up the cost and it's \$143 but then we got to thinking, to our knowledge there had been no accidents. And, Butch had said with the sun reflecting on the mirror it could make it worse so we just canned that idea. The second thing we discussed last month about yard debris and perhaps having a cleanup during the spring / fall. Trustee Lewis: We don't really have a place to pick up leaves and debris. Cheryl: What recourse do we have? Fiscal Officer Miller: Rick Beck always said bring the leaves to his house, he uses it as compost for his garden. You would need to call him to confirm that he still does that, but it's a possibly option. Ok, here are two new items: 1. Street Light we texted the Township because we have one that's totally out. Trustee Lewis: All you have to do is give the pole number to John and he'll call it in. 2. Empty Lot - used to be mowed 2x/yr. that I think is owned by someone separate on either side. Next to 8976 Maple. He has farm tractors, a boat, sitting on a lot. Trustee Lewis: Do you remember mowing that John? John: No Butch: They have farm equipment, etc. Trustee Lewis to Chief Core: Is there anything we can do about that? Chief Core: If I can appeal to the prosecutor with photos that they need to be housed in a suitable structure, I can try that. Cheryl: The house next to it has been empty more than a year ago. There are 6-7 vehicles in the lot. We know of another neighbor who offered to purchase it but the owner said no. I do have license plates. Chief Core: Is that the complaint form you have there? Cheryl: Yes, it is. Chief Core: If you don't mind, I'll just take that and see what I can do. Cheryl: Great, thank you!

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**Fiscal Officer Business – Lisa Miller**

- **Financial FYI from the Fiscal Officer** – Starting fund balance on May 1, 2021 was \$1,315,865.97. Revenue deposited in May was \$19,734.57 and Expenses were \$32,860.27 with a month ending balance on May 31, 2021 of \$1,302,740.27. We should receive the second half Real Estate Tax Settlement from Logan County Auditor, Jack Reser in August, 2021. Our YTD Revenue received is \$414,062.58 and YTD Expenditures are \$226,814.68.
- **OTARMA – Sent us the annual Distribution Check in the amount of \$1028.61 as well as certificates of liability coverage** to put in all Township vehicles. I gave four insurance cards to Chief Core for cruisers and four to John Newland for dump trucks. They must be in all vehicles for proof of liability coverage.
- **SAY Dumpsters** - advised there were 12...20-cubic yard roll off dumpsters used during Dumpster Days with an included 3 tons of waste disposal each. Four (4) at each location: IL Spillway, Orchard Island and Township Building. Trustee Lewis: We had the Dumpster Days this year and had some major, major problems. So, next year the dumpsters will be located only in Lewistown at the Township Hall on the first Thursday and Friday of the first full week of June (in 2022 that will be Thursday, June 9<sup>th</sup> and Friday, June 10<sup>th</sup>). We had people throwing couches, chairs, recliners way over the top of the dumpster and being verbally abusive to Trustee Faulder and John. If we locate them just here, we have a backhoe we can push things down and get more in there. And, we will be here to make sure only the things allowed to go in the dumpster are put in there – anything else, they take back home. Trustee Faulder: I came back from lunch and there were tires and a propane tank in there....neither are allowed. John: And a toilet on the ground. Chief Core: In one case they had a couple threaten the driver and I can confirm there were people harassing John, myself and others. Trustee Lewis: Yes, but this couple was sweating profusely and it wasn't hot out. They may have been under the influence of drugs or alcohol... Chief Core: I can confirm they were. Trustee Lewis: They were using language that they shouldn't be using out in public and got on John, we don't have to and won't deal with that kind of abusive behavior. Greg Freytag: Wasn't there an old beat up black truck that was dumping a bunch of stuff? Chief Core: Yes, he's not a resident of Washington Township. His girlfriend's dad lives on Park Street. Multiple people: His name is Timmy. Chief Core: The Township does this as a service to the community and just like everything you always have a few that ruin it for everybody. I told the people causing the problem who I had been dealing with that the Township doesn't have to do provide this service. They do it to benefit Washington Township residents but if they keep making it difficult for them, they might pull the plug on it. Trustee Lewis: We're not going to pull the plug yet, but from now on the Dumpster Days will be held only at the Washington Twp. Hall. We'll see how that goes.
- **OTA Information on ARP Funding** – FYI article from OTA (made extra copies for anyone attending meeting) regarding the explanation as to why Townships are considered "non-entitlement units of local government" which excludes them from critical funding that all other local governments (Cities, Villages, etc.) do qualify for and are receiving. Many of the Villages have a much lower population but can receive funds that the Townships can't. Please ask your State Representative Nino Vitale (District 85) and State Senator (District 12) Matt Huffman know that you want them to advocate for all of Ohio's Townships to be eligible for the ARP Funding.
- **Logan County Engineer 2021 Annual Meeting** – Mtg. was held June 9, 2021 at 2:00 PM; Note the **Round 36 Application Deadlines and Meeting Schedule** for 2022 OPWC Logan County. Most important item is **Proposed 2022 completed paving and chip seal request forms are due to County Engineer's office before 4:00 PM on July 15, 2021**. So, for Washington Township **John should have paving form completed by our next meeting, Monday, July 12, 2021**. John can meet with Trustee Lewis if he needs to ask questions and/or confirm anything as Trustee Lewis is the Road Liaison. John will need to present to the Trustees roads being submitted for paving in 2022 using OPWC funds as well as sales tax funds if needed. Trustees will need to sign it and then designate John or a Trustee to **drop off to County Engineer by the July 15, 2021 deadline**. Otherwise, we would lose the OPWC monies. I will be able to take care of the Estimate, Authorizing Legislation, and CFO due on September 23, 2021. Attached are the letter and revised funds spreadsheet. The spreadsheet looks wrong to me and I don't have the time with audit starting tomorrow and me going out of town. I will look at it while out of town and report back. Maybe it is correct, but I tried multiple ways of making sense of it; some townships final numbers are under and others are over. I'll let you know what I find. Tucker, did you attend the meeting and do you have the paving request form as I didn't receive any of those, just the spreadsheet. Trustee Berg: Yes, I attended the meeting and they made some mistakes - so the numbers you have are not correct. FO Miller: The letter advised this is the updated spreadsheet. Trustee Berg: There is another update to the updated sheet and I did receive the paving request forms.
- **Update on Audit** – The Audit will be held Tuesday, June 15<sup>th</sup> and Wednesday, June 16<sup>th</sup> at the Township Hall. They are auditing both Washington Township and Stokes Township records. All Townships are audited every other year and then those audits are posted on the Auditor of State's website. I also will post ours on the Township website once it's completed and has made it through it's rounds of approvals.
- **Purchases Requesting Approvals:**  
I'm asking for the following equipment for the Police Department to be approved if the Trustees agree it is needed:
  - **Rugged Modems** – In Cruisers > I was able to replace all of the Verizon jetpacks in the cruisers and put a spare for PD in the Maintenance Bldg. so John can use when needed and PD knows their spare is in the Maintenance Bldg. should they have a problem with one. They are faster, however, what the PD really needs are the in-car Ruggedized Modems. I'm asking the Trustees to approve the purchase of four (4) ruggedized modems (one for each cruiser) at a cost of \$750 each for a total of \$3,000, please. There may be a slight additional charge if the SD charges to put them in but I'm selecting the same Modem and Antenna that the Sheriff's Dept. uses and Lt. Ryan Furlong said he has someone there that can install them. We would ship back the jetpacks at that time once we confirm connectivity is a GO with the new modems. They will have a stronger signal, maintain connectivity, perform well under good or bad conditions, connect quickly to other officers and agencies, increases job performance having the right tool and can better serve our community because you have more time to focus on policing, protecting and serving residents in Washington Township rather than trying to figure out why your car's technology isn't working. Trustee Faulder made a motion to approve \$3500 for the ruggedized modems and antennas and Trustee Berg seconded. A vote was taken and all answered Aye – motion passed 3-0.
  - **Ruggedized Tablets** – We need two new tablets for Chief Core and the shared cruiser. They are using very old Panasonic laptops that are not only **not** compatible with the in-car printer to print out tickets, they are so slow I could go have gone inside to cook dinner and come back out and still be waiting for our task to complete. Literally, it took 5 minutes to swap jetpacks on most of the laptops – but Chief's took 45 minutes as we had to restart it three times. I already understood his frustration as I know the Trustees do. However, most of the Police Department's budget is spent in salaries / OPERS because they are out there getting it done every day working with what they have. They collected enough funds during the impound car sale in January and Lt. Thompson advised they are working with the Prosecutor on

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### Fiscal Officer Business – Lisa Miller (Cont'd)

- **Ruggedized Tablets Continued** - the release of cash taken during arrests so that will be enough to purchase these two laptops as long as they continue watching their spending. These two ruggedized Gtach tablets come with a 3-year warranty and are built for Emergency Responders. Trustee Lewis: Does the screen size matter? Chief Core: To Lisa's point it will fit in the bracket that we already have. Trustee Faulder made a motion to approve \$6,000 for two new laptops for cruisers and Trustee Berg seconded. A vote was taken and all answered Aye – motion passed 3-0.
- **In-Car and Body Cams** – FYI > I have spoken with Trustee Faulder and Chief Core as there are many options out there for both of these items. I have spent a lot of time on the phone with five different vendors and you have the quotes for three of them. I'm including two new quotes – one is for StuntCam that Lt. Thompson reached out to and they sent him one to try. He does like how it works. However, they do not sell In-Car cameras. The other is for Brite as they sell both items so I am including their bid as well. I also have talked with Lt Ryan Furlong who advised although they chose ProVision they are now looking at WatchGuard is what Dublin uses and they tested a lot of different vendors products before choosing WatchGuard. It's my advice instead of jumping the gun and getting a trial by the first vendor who wants to send one (they will all do that) and purchase it too quickly, let's do a formal decision analysis with our musts and our wants. We will ask each vendor to send one body cam so we would have a total of 4-5 of them that we can try. This allows us to see if we like how they perform and rank them in order of 1-5. My son Jeremy Miller advised we can make a trip to Dublin and see both the in-car and the body cams and they can do a demo and some Q&A. Lt. Ryan Furlong would like to go along with us to Dublin. So, working together both within our own PD Department, our Trustees, as well as with other Police Departments and Lt. Furlong at the Sheriff's Department. I feel this will ensure we are all selecting the best possible product.

We do currently have body cams and in-car cameras that work and can be shared. It's not the best solution but better than purchasing something only to regret that decision a year or two later when it isn't working correctly and not meeting the needs of the Police Department. Trustee Faulder is going to set up on-site and/or Zoom meetings with each vendor and we will also include Lt. Furlong in those sessions. What does everyone think about that? Trustees (all): We agree testing the cameras out and inquiring of other law enforcement agencies will help us choose the best possible option for WTPD.

### Police Department – Chief Rick Core

- **Budget and Equipment** - As a tax payer myself I've communicated in meetings that one portable radio would last ten years. These companies realize they don't get repeat business so there are built in factors making their products obsolete in a very short time frame and it's most evident in technical equipment. To Lisa's point the communications that she does for us and the support of this Board of Trustees and Fiscal Officer are the best situation that the township has had in a long, long time. Prior to this board there was a lack of communication and a lot of fussing etc. the dots haven't been connected as well as they are right now. A lot of progress being made as everyone wants the same thing. Lisa pointed out the rugged modems and laptops are our most immediate needs. I complain the most about computers - now I would hate to work without a computer. We type in a plate # and comes up they are wanted on a felony warrant. We treat it as such so that info is valuable to us. Another example of companies building obsolete equipment, we have printers in our cruisers that will print out our tickets for us. It auto populates and prints out. A lot of pluses for us. State gave us the printers and we got them installed but didn't realize they took special paper. We found out that two of our laptops can't use these printers due to not being compatible. I appreciate the support this community gives us and it is hard to go to the public and ask for money. If not for the community we wouldn't be here. And we try to be the best Police Department we can and reduce the drug element from Dayton, Columbus, etc. we've had them tell us they knew to stay out of Washington Township.
- **Donations** - Lisa had also mentioned donations - this envelope contains a number of checks. It's \$3,850 and I intend to write each of them a thank you note, I am so amazed at their generosity. We really need the body cams but can't afford them. Lisa, here are the checks and they did note in the memo section that these donations are for the body cameras.
- **Defib Machine Batteries** – Chief Core: Currently we have three defib machines without good batteries. Fiscal Officer Miller to Trustees: That's a must, right? Can Chief Core purchase the batteries for the defib machines? Trustees: Yes! FO Miller: Saving even one life is worth that investment. Chief Core: Yes, I'll check on cost and get with you for a purchase order.
- **Auditor, Dave Yost** – Most of you know that Cities are defunding police. I have to applaud Dave Yost State of Ohio Attorney General. He wants to give all Police Officers either \$500 or \$1,000 depending on hire date and full time or part time. An act like that is much appreciated – more than you know.
- **CFS - nothing glaring; 258 calls for month of May.**
- **Fourth of July** - Trustees are aware of everything I do. Getting the cruisers in for service. Our 2016 cruiser with 198,000 miles on it had a motor fan that caught fire.... I'm constantly trying to think of a way to keep these cruisers on the road. John takes a look at it when he's able to but he's got his own work to do so we hate to ask. I don't want to sound like all gloom and doom but want the township to be aware of the resources we have to use. Just hoping all cruisers hold up for the larger than normal crowd we are expecting at Indian Lake on July 3<sup>rd</sup> – crossing our fingers no mechanical problems.
- **Questions Anyone?** -
  - **Greg Freytag** - How do we get grants? Chief Core: For Police Departments - the State of Ohio takes care of the State and we are last in the line. It's difficult to garner any resources. I almost thought Lisa was going to have a stroke when a State gentleman said the State of Ohio does not recognize townships as entitled to monies available to Cities and Villages....it is not a community. Lisa said "What did you just say"? Lisa: Well, we are a larger entity than most Villages, cover more miles of road maintenance, have our own Police Department...and he was telling me the Township is not entitled to the same funds!?! That seems outrageous and unfair. Chief Core: She's working on that for us. Thanks to the residents of Washington Township who we have done a number of grant applications with us. They are time consuming but worth it if we get just one piece of equipment from it.

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**Police Department – Chief Rick Core (cont'd)**

- **Kevin Barth** - Drug traffic - how do you get to keep the vehicles or the cash? Chief Core: We make an arrest (drug) they have material packaged, we will submit that case to the prosecutor and if he agrees it is a drug trafficking case then anything that was seized during the arrest whether it was drugs, money, car, firearms will eventually come back to us, less what the prosecutor will keep (50%). And, we have the impound lot out back here. If we seize the vehicle and are successful in prosecuting that case, once we get a journal entry that it is ok to sell those vehicles, then we go thru the process of getting a salvage title and work with Lisa to get it advertised thru Govdeals.com. Once the vehicle is sold and paid for the new owner come here to pick the vehicle up. Money flows electronically. Greg Freytag: That money is part of projected funds so it's only spent if you collect it? Chief Core: Correct.

**Zoning – Gary Bias, Zoning Inspector**

- **Handled approximately 40 calls last month**
- **One (1) zoning permit was issued for:**
  - Fence & shed at 9631 Fairview Ave
- **Violation letter status update:**
  - Got a call from residents at 2983 SR 235 that they got their mower fixed & have mowed all the grass & the Amish will be cutting & baling their hay. I am in the process of hauling 1 of the disabled vehicles a week to the junk yard. Told them to continue this process as I will be driving by to check frequently.
  - I will be going by to check the Connie Francis property at 7694 C R 91 in Lewistown and if it hasn't been cleaned up I'll be sending her a certified violation letter.
  - I will be going by to check the Donald Stonerock at 7426 West St. to see if the hole in the roof in the back of the house was closed up. If not, I will be sending him a certified letter.
  - Haven't heard back from William Martindill at 7411 Center St. for the 2 campers. So, I will be sending him a certified letter later this week.
- I must apologize for my lack of coverage out in the field this past month. As I had mentioned in the last township meeting I was scheduled to have my right knee replaced for a second time at Mary Rutan on May 19. But when they went to replace the knee they were concerned in might contain bacteria. So, they put an antibiotic spacer in the knee & put me back together. They kept me in the hospital until all the lab tests could be done on the culture they removed to determine that it was not infected. They sent me home with instructions to take it easy until I go back in this Wednesday June 16 to have my right knee replaced. I will probably be in the hospital more than likely until Friday when I hoping they send me home. I will try to respond to any zoning calls I get but may not be returning all of them until Monday June 21. My wife will be my uber driver for the next 6 weeks and taking me out to write permits. I've been asking people to come out to the car to meet me & so far it works.
- Any questions or follow-ups for me?

**Road Department – John Newland, Road Superintendent**

- **Orchard Island** - John: On Orchard Island Crescent, Park and all that we've had a couple of complaints about water not going down during the heavy, heavy rain we've been having. I want to make it clear that they are not plugged. Trustee Lewis: Someone called and couldn't find anything at first until... John: There are nine (9) catch basins with 6" lines. To cure that problem, it would take an 18" outlet and the distance it would have to run would be about \$40,000; the tile alone is \$21,000. So, we put up with it 3-4 times a year or put in new tile. They get mad it gets so backed up; the high end one looks like it is percolating but the one it's going into is swirling slowly like a toilet. Please be patient and just wait for it to go down. Again, this only happens when there is very heavy rain.
- **Sign** – John to Trustee Faulder: Jason, the sign you talked about I think DP&L buried it. I can change it Wednesday with a new pole and move those out.
- **Mowing** - is fairly caught up and is slowing down. We haven't had a lot of rain. But if it rains a lot it will pick back up again.
- **Sealcoating** - I did get a quote from Stanley - \$2800 to sealcoat the parking lots. Trustee Faulder made a motion to approve the quote for \$2800 for sealcoating and Trustee Berg seconded. A vote was taken and the motion passed 3-0 in favor.
- **Sinkhole on 33** –O.U.P.S. has been contacted and we are putting in the culvert on Wednesday. Had an old galvanized culvert that gave out. Trustee Lewis: I got a call from Darrell Crockett so I took his place while John came in to fill it with gravel. John: Tile is all good. We'll put riff raff over it and cover it.
- **Mausoleum open on Memorial Day**; I locked it up at 8:00-9:00 PM.
- **Orchard Island road cuts** - Greg Freytag: Can we put this in the paper that something has to happen? FO Miller: Are they just cold patching those cuts? John: Yes, just a quick cold patch. I'll get a hold of Scott Coleman and see what he thinks.

**LUC Board – Trustee Berg**

- Minutes from last two months nothing for us.

**EMS Board – Trustee Lewis**

- Not much going on there things are going pretty smooth. Chief called me on Sunday morning, we had to put an associate on administrative paid leave. Several complaints about one of the employees so we're going to have an outside investigator come in and interview everyone that works there and he will give us his results and we'll go from there.

**Fire Board – Trustee Faulder**

- Nothing much for May
- No water usage
- Maintenance on truck was \$1800; I found a weld that needed replaced so they are doing that
- Paving the parking lot for \$2200
- Donations are paying for having the helipad repaved
- Having the training class for new sonar class on May 23rd

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**Old Business – Trustees**

- None

**New Business – Trustees**

- Trustee Lewis: Ball tournament was held at the park and I went over went it was finished. It was cleaner then than it was before. Need a new soap dispenser in the ladies’ room it got broken. First toilet in ladies room has a problem not flushing right.
- Trustee Lewis: Roof on middle field has a brace they might hit their head on it every now and then.
- Fiscal Officer Miller: I’ve seen a lot of older kids (HS) both on Lola at the same time and we just paid \$1400 to replace the broken one. I explain what happened and ask them politely to get off and they do. Can we get a sign showing age limits for the various playground equipment? Trustees: Yes
- Chief Core: The Red, White and Boom in Columbus was cancelled so Indian Lake Fireworks are going to be the biggest in the State of Ohio which will certainly cause its share of problems with so many outside of Logan County coming to see the fireworks.
